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The Core Elements	
1. Author.	The person or organization that created the source. The name of the first author should be reversed (last name first – Smith, Jane). Any subsequent authors’ names can be listed in regular order. Organization titles should be listed in their natural order. If a work has more than two authors, list only the first and follow it with et al. (This is a Latin phrase meaning “and others.”)
2. Title of Source.	The specific name of the source. Titles of stand-alone publications are in italics. Titles of shorter works that are part of a larger work (such as a news article, episode title, chapter title, etc.) should be enclosed in quotation marks.
3. Title of Container,	The larger work of which the source is a part. If the source is part of a larger work, use the title of the larger work as the container. The container title is usually italicized.
4. Other Contributors,	Others who are credited with the creation of the source. Other contributors may include editors, directors, translators, narrators, or performers. Indicate the contributors’ role with a phrase such as adapted by, directed by, edited by, translated by, performance by, etc.
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6. Number,	Volume and number. If the source has a volume and number, list it like this – vol. 3, no. 2.
7. Publisher,	The organization or company responsible for producing the source. If the publisher has already been listed as the author or container, there is no need to repeat it here.
8. Publication Date,	Date that the source was published. List in international style – 20 Mar. 2017
9. Location.	Page numbers, website URL, DOIs (digital object identifiers), etc. Preface page numbers with p. (for a single page) or pp. (for a range of pages). http:// and https:// can be omitted.

NOTE: Access dates are OPTIONAL—check with your instructor. If the instructor requires them, place them after the location like this – Accessed 5 Apr. 2017.
